- Benjamin Tucker: "An anarchist is anyone who denies the necessity and legitimacy of government"
- "Firmly and forever outside the mainstream".

- State<u>less</u> socialism
- "All property is theft"
- Peter Kropotkin (1842-1921)
- Mutual aid, mutualism

- Pierre-Joseph Proudhon (1809-1865)
- Mutualism
- Attacks all forms of property, a cooperative productive system organized towards need rather than profit and organized within selfgoverning communities

- Pierre-Joseph Proudhon (1809-1865)
- "...to be governed is o be watched over, inspected, spied on, legislated, regimented, closed in, indoctrinated, preached at, controlled, assessed, evaluated, censored, commanded; all by creatures that have neither the right, nor the wisdom, nor the virtue"

- Mikhail Bakunin(1814-1876)
- Anarchism via revolutionary means
- "The urge to destroy is also a creative urge of human life"

- Georges Sorel (1847-1922)
- Defense of violence
- The emphasis on myths
- "General Strike" as a myth to mobilize people, form resistance and implement radical change
- Collectivist anarchists mostly criticized revisionists
